National Wildlife Federation Habitat Certification for Schiff Ken Rendall, Trustee

This past summer, Schiff Natural Lands
Trust earned its National Wildlife Federation Habitat (NWFH) Certification.
The certification recognizes our ongoing efforts to maintain our property in a way that promotes the welfare of wildlife that live within the preserve. Schiff was able to get this designation by meeting the certification requirements of the application.

As a private homeowner, you can earn certification by ensuring that your yard offers a number of different criteria that support wildlife. You'll need to provide food, water, shelter, and places for different species to reproduce and raise their young, in addition to using sustainable or wildlife-friendly landscaping practices. You can find more information by



googling wildlife habitat certification or going to the NJ Audubon website.

When you get out and walk along our trails, you may come across any variety of animals we hope to help. Chipmunks, rabbits, and turtles are among those on the smaller end of the spectrum, while larger animals include foxes, coyotes, deer, and black bears. And although the preserve does operate a Deer Management Program, there is no hunting allowed of other

animals. The hunting is focused solely on reducing the herd size to a more sustainable level for the size of the preserve.

For bird watchers, the Mount Paul Preserve in Chester has naturally evolved into a bird haven. The meadow and wetlands draw numerous varieties of birds to the old quarry site. The North Branch of the Raritan River along Union Schoolhouse Road is a place where some have been lucky enough to spot an eagle or two fishing. Blue bird boxes around the Great Meadow and in Mount Paul Preserve provide homes for pairs to raise multiple broods of chicks in a year. We hope the new bat boxes mounted throughout the preserve will help our bat population to thrive. All of these options help provide more habitat for the many types of creatures who make their home at Schiff. Maybe you'll want to do the same where you live?

Schiff's Board of Trustees Suffers Losses and Gains Pat Charney, Trustee

This year, Schiff has experienced a number of changes in the composition of its board of trustees. Sadly, our longtime treasurer, Joe Gomeringer, passed away last May. Joe contributed countless hours of his time, immeasurable amounts of energy, and even his accounting firm's resources to Schiff for over 20 years. He was also the repository of a wealth of Schiff history, from how the preserve came to be, to details regarding the

various deeded land trusts, and so on. Joe helped make Schiff what it is today. We thank him, from the bottom of our hearts, for his years of service and meaningful contributions.

Schiff also lost former trustee and board secretary Bill Sandelands in October. Bill served on the board from 2019-2021 and brought his legal expertise to the table to aid in managing easements and tax exemption issues. Bill and his family lived in the Mendham area for 24

years, the last 12 of which were as a neighbor to Schiff. Bill enjoyed hiking the local trails and cycling through the New Jersey countryside.

Both men will be dearly missed. Our thoughts go out to their families, friends, and colleagues.

Additions to the board include two local residents. Bob Osner-Hackett, a Brookrace resident, teaches middle school science in the Mount Olive school system. Bob brings his biology and ecology

background and optimistic enthusiasm to the group, especially the Development and Outreach Committee, hoping to help Schiff meet and exceed its goals for years to come.

Tom Wells, a long time Borough resident, is putting his long and impressive career in conservation to use at Schiff. Tom's years spent at the Nature Conservancy, as director of the Green Acres Program for NJDEP, and at the New Jersey Conservation Foundation give

Programs for our Youngest Stewards Have Expanded

Developing a sense of wonder about nature from a young age is the focus of the Fledglings spring program for preschoolers. An offshoot of the popular Summer Nature Program, this program utilizes experiential learning along with art, literature, and play to bring the outdoor world into the minds and comfort zones of children 3 to 5 years old. The day starts with a mini lesson such as insects in our forest, followed by a trail hike with backpacks full of water and snacks. Though the day starts with a theme, the lessons expand with the curiosity of the children; a tree lesson can easily turn into one about worms and mushrooms. After an exploratory walk to any of the Schiff "hot spots" like Critter Cove, the Pine Grove, or the Lean-to, we stop for a snack and a story.

Free play is an important element of the program, so time is set aside for the imagination and curiosity of the children to take over. At Critter Cove the children have made forts, discovered many toads, set up a bake shop with leaves and sticks being served as muffins, and transformed a large fallen log into a school bus. With each encounter we are helping the children develop an environmental ethic, especially in how to handle, or not handle, living animals. Our "one finger touching" rule is key to understanding how to be gentle with the environment and with each other.

Wildlife Chronicles; Coming of Winter

FALL IS HERE and winter is quickly approaching. Animals are scurrying around to prepare themselves for the long slumber that lays ahead. Winter

is a time for life to slow down for all. Bats, bears and snakes are among a host of animals that employ a variety of physiological strategies to combat what to us humans are extremely challenging conditions. Hibernation is just one of many

strategies that allow our forest friends to thrive from season to season.

It's as if nature is taking a much-needed break. But don't be fooled, there is more activity in our natural communities than meets the eye. Bald Eagles will be busy preparing their nests for the newest chicks. This early nesting and egg laying gives them an advantage as chicks will be ready to fly in Spring when fish and small mammals

will be more plentiful as a food source.

While the black bear population of New Jersey does not technically hibernate, they do employ strategies to

face the harsh winter months. Black bears in our area enter a state of torpor where their body temperature decreases and their metabolism slows, falling back on the fat reserves they stored up in the months prior to winter.

Gray Squirrels will be plentiful and can be seen dancing up and down the trees in a mating ritual that begins in January and continues throughout the early months of the new year. Other wildlife moving about the preserve in winter are the deer, fox, coyote, shrews, and mice. Look for their tracks in the mud or freshly fallen snow. Winter is a season that offers a vastly different view of a thriving preserve. Come out and enjoy a hike and see how alive winter can be!
